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




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



About the OSFL

The Orchestra of the Southern Finger Lakes was created with the merger of two long-established orchestras: the *Corning Philharmonic Society* and the *Elmira Symphony and Choral Society*, with the mission of providing live classical music to the region. The OSFL and its predecessors have been thrilling audiences throughout the Twin Tiers for over 100 years. Since its first season in 1995-1996, the OSFL has been committed to the performance of masterworks of the orchestra repertoire, as well as performances of works by living composers.

Corning-Elmira Musical Arts, Inc. is the official name of this 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organization. The OSFL name grew in popularity, and the organization now has the assumed name of the Orchestra of the Southern Finger Lakes (OSFL). It is comprised of the professional orchestra of the same name, the Chorus of the Southern Finger Lakes, the youth ensembles, and the professional chamber music ensembles. The standard programs include the main stage orchestra concert series, the Musicians' Choice Chamber Series, weekly rehearsals of the chorus and youth ensembles, the annual Hertzog Concerto & Aria Competition, Stories with Music educational concerts, and a variety of outreach concerts, workshops, and masterclasses with the OSFL's guest artists.

Under the guidance of distinguished Music Director & Conductor, Toshiyuki Shimada, the OSFL preserves the classical roots of modern music and is a strong supporter of highlighting the musical achievements of young musicians through the youth ensemble programs, as well as the annual Hertzog Concerto & Aria Competition for young artists in grades 9 - 12. The OSFL collaborates with regional cultural partners, artists, and likeminded organizations to advance mutual artistic growth in the greater Elmira-Corning area.

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Chorus of the Southern Finger Lakes



The Chorus of the Southern Finger Lakes, directed by William Cowdery, is an enthusiastic community of volunteer singers who perform with the Orchestra of the Southern Finger Lakes. Boasting on average 60 voices, the symphonic Chorus makes it possible for the OSFL to perform some of the greatest musical works, such as Handel's Messiah or Mozart's Requiem.

There's nothing quite like singing with a full symphony orchestra. Participants describe the experience as "powerful," "life-affirming," and "breathtaking." Chorus members come back year after year to perform with the region's premier orchestra.

This year the Chorus will sing with the Corning Area Community Concert Band at the Corning Museum of Glass – a concert that was originally scheduled for 2020 but canceled due to the pandemic. The concert is November 5, 2023 at 3 PM and is free and open to the public. Donations are encouraged to support the CACCB scholarship fund.

WILLIAM COWDERY works as musical director and organist of the First Congregational Church of Ithaca, as well as on the staff of Cornell University's music library. He has taught at Cornell, Ithaca College, and Colgate University. Cowdery authored numerous articles in the New Harvard Dictionary of Music and the Harvard Biographical of Musicians, coedited The Compleat Mozart with Neal Zaslaw (Norton), and recently published a string quartet setting of Bach's Goldberg Variations (Presser).







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Youth Ensembles

For a unique experience during this time of rebuilding after the pandemic, the Youth Orchestra and Junior String Ensemble have combined to create The Young People's Orchestra of the Southern Finger Lakes. Conducted by OSFL violinists Margaret Matthews and Gary Chollet, this is a student orchestra of some of the finest young musicians in our region. The Young People's Orchestra offers an opportunity for our talented local youth to grow as musicians and make friends who share similar interests. Being involved in this program is a great learning experience that many students say helps them to have a true appreciation for working with a group, as well as music in general.

YPO students learn valuable life skills such as teamwork and leadership, knowing when to blend and follow as well as gaining confidence to gracefully shine in the spotlight. Participating in weekly rehearsals engrains students with the life-long habit of problem solving, creativity, and the persistent pursuit of excellence and mastery.

This year's programming includes the annual side-by-side concert with the OSFL as well as several other concerts and workshops. Students will perform in the lobby before the OSFL holiday concert and at community outreach concerts. Performances in hospitals and nursing homes provide mixed-generation interactions, and bring emotional support and entertainment to an appreciative audience. YPO students have opportunities to perform on the OSFL's outreach programs and to participate in workshops and master classes taught by the OSFL professional musicians and world-class guest artists.

OSHIYUKI SHIMADA is Music Director and Conductor of the Eastern Connecticut Symphony Orchestra in New London; Music Director and Conductor of the Orchestra of the Southern Finger Lakes; Music Director and Conductor of the New Britain Symphony Orchestra and has been Music Director of the Yale Symphony Orchestra. He is also Music Director Laureate of the Portland Symphony Orchestra in Portland, Maine, for which he served as Music Director from 1986 to 2006. Prior to his Portland engagement he was Associate Conductor of the Houston Symphony Orchestra for six years. Since 1998, he has also served as Principal Conductor of the Vienna Modern Masters record label in Austria.

Maestro Shimada has been a frequent guest conductor with a number of international orchestras, including the Royal Scottish National Orchestra; L'Orchestre National de Lille in France; La Orquesta Filharmónica de Jalisco, Guadalajara, Mexico; the Slovak Philharmonic; the Lithuanian State Symphony Orchestra in Vilnius; and most of the major symphony orchestras of the Republic of Turkey including the Presidential Symphony Orchestra, Istanbul State Symphony Orchestra, Borusan Istanbul Philharmonic, and Bilkent Symphony. In America, he has guest conducted the Knoxville Symphony, the Houston Symphony, the Honolulu Symphony Orchestra, the Chautauqua Symphony Orchestra, the San José Symphony Orchestra, and many other US and Canadian orchestras. He has performed in distinguished concert halls all over the world such as Carnegie Hall, the Great Hall of the Moscow Tchaikovsky Conservatory, Boston Symphony Hall, the Vienna Musikverein, the Auditorium Fondazione Cariplo Milano and the Sala São Paulo.

He has collaborated with distinguished artists such as Itzhak Perlman, Andre Watts, Peter Serkin, Emanuel Ax, Yefim Bronfman, Janos Starker, Joshua Bell, Hilary Hahn, Cho-Liang Lin, Sir James Galway, and Evelyn Glennie.

Shimada has had several state and city holidays named in his honor: Toshiyuki Shimada Day in Houston, TX; Toshiyuki Shimada Week in Portland, Maine; and Toshiyuki Shimada Day in the State of Maine; Toshiyuki Shimada Day in New London, CT; and Toshiyuki Shimada Week in the State of Connecticut. In May 2006 he was awarded an Honorary Doctorate Degree in Fine Arts by Maine College of Arts.

He records with Naxos and Albany Records, and the Vienna Modern Masters label, currently has eighteen compact discs, and his *Music from the Vatican* with the Prague Chamber Orchestra and Chorus is available through iTunes, Rhapsody, Apple and Spotify.

Maestro Shimada held a teaching position at Yale University, as Associate Professor of Conducting with Yale School of Music and Department of Music from 2005 to 2019. He has a strong commitment to music education and has been a faculty member of Rice University, Houston, TX; the University of Southern Maine; and served as Artist Faculty at the Houston Institute of Aesthetic Study. He is on the faculty of the Annual New York Conductor's Workshop.

Augusto Diemecke, Concertmaster

Augusto Diemecke started his violin studies in Mexico with his father, Emilio Diemecke at the age of 11. His training continued with teachers including Joanna Maikovska, Enrique Espin Yepes, Jorge Risi, Manuel Suarez, Fredell Lack and Kenneth Goldsmith. Mr. Diemecke has performed in master classes with Itzhak Perlman, Henryk Szeryng and Sergi Luca. He has studied at The University of Houston School of Music and The University of Guanajuato School of Music. He holds dual degrees from the Conservatorio Nacional de Musica and the Ollyn

Yolitztly School of Music, both in Mexico. As an active performer Mr. Diemecke has performed in Mexico, the United States, Peru and throughout Europe. Orchestral positions include the Mexico City Philharmonic, Guanajuato Symphony, OFUNAM, Houston Symphony, Houston Ballet Orchestra, Cayuga Chamber Orchestra, Orchestra de Norte do Portugal, Lake Charles Symphony Orchestra, Colgate University Orchestra, Tri-Cities Opera and Orchestra of the Southern Finger Lakes. Mr. Diemecke has performed as concertmaster in many orchestras including the Orquesta Philharmonique du Tournon in France, Orchestra of the Southern Finger Lakes, Colgate University Orchestra, Utica Symphony, Catskill Symphony, Schenectady Orchestra, Tri-cities Opera, Flint Symphony Orchestra, Orchestre Philharmonique De Rhodanine and Orquestra do Norte do Portugal.



Debrah Devine, Assistant Concertmaster

Violinist Debrah Devine is an active musician in Upstate New York. She attended SUNY College at Fredonia and CUNY Brooklyn College where she studied Violin Performance with Cornelius Dufallo and Liang Chai. She is a member of the Binghamton Philharmonic, Principal Second Violin for the Catskill Symphony, a member of the Erehwon Ensemble, Principal Second Violin for the Fenimore Chamber Orchestra and Assistant Concertmaster at the Orchestra of the Southern Finger Lakes. During July Debrah serves as Principal Second Violin at the MostArts

Festival. She performs with many chamber ensembles across Upstate New York including the Castalia String Quartet based in Oneonta, New York. A dedicated pedagogue, Debrah teaches violin and viola to people from all walks of life in Cooperstown NY and in Oneonta. She also conducts the Preparatory Orchestra of Little Delaware Youth Ensemble based in Oneonta.



Craig Evans, Principal Second Violin

Craig Evans holds a bachelor's degree in music education from Ithaca College, a master's of music performance and a master's of music education from the Florida State University, and a doctorate of education in educational leadership and education law from the University of Central Florida. After several years teaching in central Florida, he became a school administrator in Orlando, and then in Ithaca, NY. He also conducted one of the Florida Symphony Youth Orchestras

in Orlando, leading the group on tours to Carnegie Hall and Europe. Since 2004, he has served in senior-level positions in higher education and other nonprofits, leading philanthropy efforts for those institutions. He retired last summer from his most recent position, associate dean at the Johns Hopkins University School of Education. Dr. Evans continues to perform in New York State and in his current residence of Baltimore, as well as work as an executive coach. In addition, he has also recently agreed to also serve as the OSFL's personnel manager.

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John Paul Tobin, Acting Principal Horn

In addition to serving as Guest Principal Violist of OSFL, JP Tobin is Principal Violist of the Williamsport Symphony, Susquehanna Valley Chorale, and Williamsport Chamber Players, Concertmaster of Mansfield Opera Theatre, and performs with the Binghamton Philharmonic, Binghamton Downtown Singers, Cantata Singers, Pennsylvania Chamber Orchestra, Commonwealth Pops, and numerous other ensembles. Now based in Lycoming County, Pennsylvania, Tobin worked as a studio musician in Los Angeles, appearing regularly on television broadcasts such as "American Idol" and "The Voice." He

teaches Viola and Baroque Violin at Lycoming College where he also serves as the director of the Lycoming College String Ensemble and "Young Artist Baroque Orchestra at Lycoming College." JP Tobin plays one of the remarkable American violas by Sarah and Alan Balmforth.

Christine holds a degree in music performance from the University of Connecticut. Former teachers include Alexander Goldfield, Luca DiCecco, Marylou Rylands and Hans Jorgen-Jensen. Christine was formerly a cellist in the Mexico City Philharmonic, as well as principal cellist in Theatre Under the Stars (Houston, TX). She is an active Suzuki Method teacher and clinician and maintains a studio of 30+ cellists at 171 Cedar Arts and in the Ithaca area. She is currently the principal cellist of the OSFL.



Mario Pietra, Principal Double Bass

Mario is an upright and electric bassist, composer, and educator from Upstate New York. He performs and records actively in the northeast with a variety of jazz groups, orchestras, and other musical projects. Mario holds a master's degree in music from Syracuse University and is the principal bassist for the OSFL.



Jeanne Sperber, Principal Flute

Jeanne Sperber is well known to Southern Tier audiences as a soloist and orchestral flutist. She serves as principal flute of the Orchestra of the Southern Finger Lakes and the MostArts Festival Orchestra. Recently, she has been heard repeatedly on WSKG Television's Expressions series. She also teaches flute at Binghamton University and SUNY Broome. Before relocating to beautiful upstate New York, she was a freelance flutist in New York City, performing in legendary venues such as

Carnegie Hall, Alice Tully Hall, Weill Hall, and Trinity Church. She has toured South America and Cuba twice as a concerto soloist.



Susan Laib, Principal Oboe

Sue has been principal oboe at the OSFL since its inception, having also held the position in the Corning Philharmonic and Elmira Symphony. Since 1989, Sue has also been the principal oboe for the Williamsport (PA) Symphony Orchestra.She has been a faculty member and is Associate Professor at Mansfield University since 1989, primarily teaching oboe, bassoon, and coaching chamber music. She holds degrees from the Eastman School of Music, University of Colorado, and Florida State. Sue is also the principal oboe for the Williamsport (PA) Symphony Orchestra.

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Emily Dobmeier, Principal Clarinet

Emily is an active clarinetist and educator, serving as the Camp and Festival Director, Vice President of Operations and Artistic Planning at Luzerne Music Center, and on clarinet faculty at the Eastman Community Music School. She has appeared as a featured artist at numerous universities and colleges throughout the country, as well as Midwest ClariFest and Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp. Emily has served as the principal clarinetist of the OSFL since 2016.



Joseph Swift, Principal Bassoon

Praised for his "soaring expression" and "impressive technical command", Joseph enjoys a varied career as a performer, educator, and recording artist. He serves as principal bassoon of the Orchestra of the Southern Finger Lakes and has performed with many ensembles across the United States, Canada, and the United Kingdom. He holds degrees from Stony Brook University, the University of Michigan, and Western Michigan University and is on faculty at the Wharton Institute for the Performing Arts in Berkeley Heights, NJ. As a chamber musician, his ensemble the Vanguard Reed Quintet received a silver medal at the Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition in 2018. Joseph's debut solo album Room to Breathe was

released in March 2023 to high critical acclaim, featuring five pandemic inspired world premieres. A New Jersey native, he enjoys spending time off the stage with his wife and dog, Dunkin.



Madison Warren, Acting Principal Horn

As a freelance horn player, Madison performs with several groups in the Rochester area including the Rochester Philharmonic, Buffalo Philharmonic, Cayuga Chamber Orchestra, Symphoria, and the Binghamton Philharmonic. She is looking forward to serving as principal horn of OSFL for their 2023-24 season. Madison completed her bachelor's of music at Oberlin Conservatory and received her master's of music as a recipient of the Performer's Certificate at the Eastman School of Music. When not making music, Madison enjoys being outside, and growing, cooking, and eating plants.



Frank Gabriel Campos, Principal Trumpet

Frank is professor emeritus of Ithaca College and a jazz and classical trumpet soloist, teacher, and author. He has played principal for the Dallas Chamber Orchestra, Texas Baroque Ensemble, Glimmerglass and Tri-Cities Operas, Binghamton and Fresno Philharmonics, and he is a founder of the Dallas Brass. He has soloed with the Eastman Wind Ensemble, the Winnipeg Symphony, and performed with Natalie Cole, Johnny Mathis, and Ella Fitzgerald. His recordings have won three Global Music Awards and he has appeared on *Performance Today* a dozen times.



Duane Smith, Principal Trombone

Duane is currently principal trombone with the Orchestra of the Southern Finger Lakes and principal trombone with the Northern Tier Symphony. He earned bachelor's and master's degrees from Oberlin Conservatory of Music. Duane was also principal trombone with the Northern Tier Symphony for ten years and has also performed with the Akron Symphony, the Northeast Pennsylvania Philharmonic, and the Binghamton Philharmonic orchestras. He recently retired from thirty-three years as a music educator, teaching instrumental music to elementary and middle school students.



Adam Peck, Principal Tuba

After substituting for several seasons Adam is honored to be appointed OSFL's new tubist. He has been Principal with the Binghamton Philharmonic Orchestra, B.C. Pops and Tri-Cities Opera Orchestra for 38 years. Adam studied music education and performance at Ithaca College and regularly performs with orchestras and brass groups in the two-state region including the Williamsport Symphony and Billtown Brass. An unabashed Bruckner lover, he lives in Muncy, PA with his wife Tena and six fur babies.

She went on to Ithaca College, where she studied with Gordon Stout, and received her M.M. in 2009. Emily served as an adjunct faculty member at the Ithaca College School of Music for many years, teaching music theory, aural skills, and percussion classes. While still a grad student at IC, Emily began playing with the OSFL in 2008 in the percussion section and became the orchestra's principal timpanist in 2012. She is

an active performer in both the Southern Tier region as well as southwestern Michigan and teaches percussion and piano as a private instructor.



Rosanna Moore, Principal Harp

Known for her quirky and engaging performances, Rosanna is fast gaining recognition as both a harpist and actor. 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Tips for Young Children at Concerts

- Prepare online—Help your children look forward to the concert by introducing them to the composers and their music at home. Go to OSFL.org to see the upcoming concert list and educational movie night schedule.
- Be comfortable—No need to dress up unless you and your children really like that.
- Easy in, easy out—Choose an aisle seat. If your child is acting antsy or vocal, it's OK to take them out to the lobby to run off some energy. Please exit and enter during applause in between pieces, for the sake of other listeners.



- Learn together—If your child has questions, please whisper and be brief. Educational activity packets are available for your children to enjoy during the performance.
- Start early—Cultivate a life-long love of music in your child!

The Considerate Concertgoer

- b Be respectful—Refrain from talking or making disruptive noise during the music.
- Turn off, tune in—Please silence all electronic devices. Turn off cameras and recording devices to protect copyrights of composers and arrangers. Set phones to dark mode if you are reading the expanded online program notes.
- Do clap—when the concertmaster (first violinist) appears onstage, when the conductor appears and when the soloist appears. If a piece has more than one movement, clap after the last movement. The conductor will signal the end of a piece by relaxing and lowering hands fully.
- Entering late is better than not at all! Latecomers should wait to be seated. It is best to wait until applause to exit and re-enter.
- Most importantly, enjoy and share the magic of music!





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The Symphonic Effect

What is the Symphonic Effect?

The Symphonic Effect is when the audience collectively experiences the "wow" of an inperson, live concert that is 100% acoustic (not electronically amplified), with sometimes over 100 highly-skilled musicians on stage performing precisely in sync harmoniously, and resonating throughout the concert hall filled with hundreds of bodies that are also resonating in sync with the music. This communal experience is like none other, inspiring peace, mental well-being, joy, and community.

This is a moment in time that will never happen exactly the same way again. It is a moment to relish and remember!

Stories with Music

The ever popular "Stories with Music" programs have been bringing the OSFL's chamber music groups into the heart of the community with free, educational concerts at public libraries in Chemung, Steuben, Schuyler, and Tioga (NY) counties in the summer.

In summer 2022, we served 12 libraries in four counties supported by five funding sources for a total of 25 free, educational concerts. In summer 2023, we performed 31 free concerts at 16 libraries and reached approximately 720 people in person and almost another 2,000 virtually. For the 23-24 school year, "Stories with Music" will go to schools with grade-appropriate renditions of the program, thanks to the John G. Ulmann Foundation and other supporters for funding this launch.

"Stories with Music" promotes literature, reading, and music in a powerful combination. Classic and modern musical works paired with published storybooks: the *Bremen Town Musicians*, the *Tortoise* & the Hare, and Alice in Wonderland, from



summer 2023, captivated audiences of all ages while introducing less familiar musical instruments such as the oboe, bassoon, French horn, harp and string instruments which are taught in only a few schools in this region.

In addition to the storybook musical performance, these narrated concerts include an introduction to the instruments, interactive audience participation, question and answer time, and a few short pieces as a sneak peak to the OSFL's upcoming concerts.










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
